Five Nights and Six Days Worth Of Clothing Is Necessary For Your Camper.

PLEASE BRING ONE SUITCASE/DUFFLE BAG PER CAMPER

1 Bathing Suit	Pajamas	Sleeping Bag/Pillow
2 Towels (Pool/Shower)	Pool Shoes/or flip flops	Shoes with good tread
Flashlight/Batteries	Hat or cap with brim	Canteen/Water Bottle
Sunblock SPF 30+	Lip balm/chapstick	Insect Repellant
Toothbrush/Paste	Hairbrush/Comb	White T-Shirt to Tie Dye
Deodorant if used	Soap	Shampoo

Suggested Comfort Items: Disposable Camera, reading book, stationary and stamps. Have your child pack with you. Show them their soap, sunblock, etc... Talk with your child about the importance of keeping track of their belongings.

NOT PERMITTED: Cell phones, digital cameras, video games, MP3 players, walkmans, CD players, radios, money, food, candy, gum, alcohol, drugs, tobacco, weapons, pets, offensive clothing and jewelry.

Please leave all valuables at home.

If child has trouble caring for his/her belongings, please be selective of what you pack. The above items are not permitted and will be taken away from your child upon arrival and returned upon departure. When you get your camper home, please check to see that camper has all his/her items, many times campers get other's things by mistake. Please return those items to the Camp Oliver office and we will inform the proper owner. Camp Oliver will not mail items that are left at camp, however, you may call the camp office and if your item was found we can arrange a time for you to pick it up.

THINGS TO DO BEFORE YOUR CHILD COMES TO CAMP OLIVER

Make sure they have spent a few nights away from home before their time at camp, to help prevent homesickness. Remind the child that she/he will be sleeping in a cabin with other children their own age and counselors, especially if they come with an older sibling. Our practice is to not allow campers to phone home during the week. Experience has shown that these calls are extremely disruptive, and there would not be enough phone lines to handle the volume. One of the valued outcomes of camp is learning independence. Phoning home would detract from that important goal. In rare circumstances due to behavior or severe homesickness, our staff will initiate calls with your camper.

Please do not promise your camper that he/she can call home.
